HEDGING AROUND A PROBLEM

Plants, hedges and trees with branches that overhang the pavement are a nuisance as well as being dangerous. They are a particular problem if there are thorns or if the pavement is narrow and it is difficult to walk round them. In the dark, low branches and the like are a special hazard, but they are a danger even in daylight to sight-impaired pedestrians.

Autumn is a good time to prune many types of greenery, so you can have a snip at branches and hedges that hang over your fence in the next few weeks. If you know your neighbour cannot manage the job on their own, perhaps you can offer to help them.

If you experience a problem with branches coming over from private property, your first move should be a polite approach to the occupants. If the problem persists then you could approach the Highway Enforcement Department of Lewisham Council who have powers under the Highways Act 1980, but tracing the responsible party may take some time. Should the offending branches be from a tree on the public highway, then you should contact the Tree Officer at the Council. In either case, before you contact them make sure you have precise details of the location to help identify the items you are calling about.

History of London — Eltham Palace


Eltham Palace is a former royal residence set in magnificent moated gardens. It was established in medieval times and used by Edward II, Henry VIII and Elizabeth I to name

but a few. Parts of the original palace still exist, including the Great Hall which was used as a prototype for other great Tudor Halls including the one at Hampton Court.

Through the centuries, Eltham Palace fell into disrepair until it came under the care of the Courtauld

family (famous in the textile business) in the 1930s. They built a new country house adjoining the Great Hall, which is now a fascinating 1930s museum piece (the design included many

innovations of the period such as underfloor central heating!), whilst outside the landscaped gardens were set out and part of the original moat restored.




Eltham Palace

Admission to the house and gardens is £4 for adults, £2 for children, and £3 concessions; access to the garden only or the house and Hall only is available at reduced prices. The Palace is only half mile from Eltham BR station.

The Council is intending to introduce a residents-only parking zone in the Conservation

Following a petition from residents in Tressillian Road who have serious problems with parking by Lewisham College students, the Council sent a questionnaire to residents in Darling Road, Avon Road, Drake Road, Tressillian Crescent and the northern ends of Tyrwhitt Road and Tressillian Road.

The questionnaire gave three options. The results are shown in the table below.

Despite these statistics the Council wanted to recommend Residents Parking "at the northern ends of Tressillian Road, Breakspears Road, Tyrwhitt Road and Wickham Road, from Lewisham Way to Drake Road".

However the Council's statistics conflict strongly with the traffic survey undertaken by the Brockley Society, where only 13% wanted Residents Parking, with the majority opting for measures to improve safety.

Following representations by The Brockley Society, the Council have recently surveyed the

views of residents of Breakspears Road, Wickham Road and Manor Avenue. We also asked that the Council consult the St. John's Area residents, Connex South East and Lewisham College.

The main problem with the College is in the evenings, when local residents arrive home and there is nowhere to park. We therefore do not think that residents-only parking from 8am to 6.30pm is the solution, especially with the attendant hassle of having to obtain and pay for day passes for visitors. These passes can only be obtained from the Council offices in Catford! Many people suggested the much simpler option that the College Staff car park could be opened to students in the evenings.

We sent the results of our survey to the Highways Department in early August, but by the end of September we had not received a reply. We will continue to liaise with the Council, Lewisham College, our M.P., Joan Ruddock and you, the residents, to try to come to a compromise that is agreeable to the majority.

Four aircraft between 4.20am and 4.30am, nine aircraft between 5.00am and 5.30am, incessant noise during the day, and one every 50 seconds, long into the evening. A typical day in "quiet" Brockley, seventeen miles to the east of Heathrow. A trial by the British Airports Authority plc to vary the nuisance caused near Heathrow means that all flights, most days of the year, are now turning over the Lewisham area for their final approach (see map).

Change made without consultation

Minister for Transport and Environment, Glenda Jackson, in a response to The Brockley Society, has acknowledged that a change to aircraft landing patterns was made in September 1995, without consultation with local residents. This change that she acknowledges is as follows, "between 4.00am and 6.00am some aircraft will be joining the Instrument Landing System further to the east, flying over areas which might not previously have been flown over during these two hours." She gives nothing other than a very tenuous reason for this change, suggesting that an aircraft slightly higher over Brockley is less noisy than an aircraft over Barnes, where aircraft arriving for Heathrow used to join the glide path.

Many residents also feel that the nuisance has increased during the day and in the evening. This is denied by the DoT.

The Brockley Society is campaigning on these issues.

- ★ for a curfew on night flights between 11.00pm and 6.00am
- **★**an equal balancing of aircraft noise between East and West London
- for quieter aircraft
- ★ to suspend the westerly preference system for early morning flights. Currently, even in conditions of flat calm, early arriving aircraft fly over South East and North East London.
- **★** Higher (and therefore quieter) approach paths
- ★ To raise awareness amongst the general public of the issues of aircraft noise and pollution

We are also looking for a genuine answer as to why the flight path changes were made. Sadly we may be unlikely to get to the bottom of the issue, but suspect that the current Terminal 5 public enquiry may have something to do with it.

Joan Ruddock MP and Lewisham Council are taking a positive interest and have both taken up our concerns with Glenda Jackson. We also brought the matter to the attention of the media, which resulted in coverage by BBC Newsroom South East who filmed a number of local representatives on Hilly Fields. The newshopper will also be running an article. Following the media campaign we have also been contacted by other community action groups both in South East and North East London

Many Brockley residents are very concerned about the changes to the flight paths and the impact this is having on our lives. To allow us to provide you with more detail on the situation and set up a special action team, we have arranged a public meeting at 8pm on Monday 17 November at the St Peter's Centre, Cranfield Road

British Airports Authority have set up a freephone noise line 0800 34 48 44 the results of which have to be taken into account by a monitoring watchdog, so please call as every complaint must be registered. 

As you are probably aware by now, non-traditional windows made of UPVC will not be given planning permission in a Conservation Area.




It was to our dismay that in 1994 the Marsha Phoenix Trust installed UPVC windows in its two properties at 90-92 Tressillian Road.

After protracted negotiations with the Council planning department, the Trust, partly because of its status, has been allowed to retain the windows, but only on the condition that they are removed and replaced by traditional timber sash windows by 2004.

THEATRE AT THE BROCKLEY JACK

All you need to know is that it makes exciting theatre. The productions I've watched have been riveting.

The set designs are the most imaginative I've seen for a small theatre. This company is not afraid to experiment with their space - they use it to their advantage-and sometimes for our discomfort. Coupled with the fine acting and choice of plays, the Brockley Jack has evolved into a cultural treat. Looking through the company's cuttings, the press agrees. All this must have been financially reassuring to both Greene King, who owns the pub and partly funds the theatre, and Mainbrace themselves, They are set to be our local theatre in residence for a while yet. The pub has benefited from the theatre's success and the two work well together. Indeed, to make an evening of it you can eat in the Brockley Jack restaurant and watch the show for just £9.95. A bargain!And the seating - it's fabulous!

A helping hand with parenthood from the NCT



What is the NCT? Founded over forty years ago, the "National Childbirth Trust is the foremost charity concerned with pregnancy, childbirth and parenthood. The NCT operates through a nation-

wide network of parents-to-be and parents, supporting each other with some 370 branches across the country run by volunteers. The central aim of the Trust is to help women have their babies happily and without fear, and to assist parents to adjust to life with a baby.

The NCT runs its own training programmes for antenatal teachers and breastfeeding counsellors, and the antenatal classes are especially popular. Local branches are able to introduce pregnant women to others expecting babies around the same time, thereby providing an opportunity both before and after birth for parents to make new friends, often with the support of an 'experienced' NCT parent of an older child. Individual branches may organise a wide range of activities from toddler groups to working mothers' groups as well as producing newsletters. Similarly in special situations,

from premature birth through to cot death, the Trust is equipped to find parents who have experienced a similar problem or disability and can offer support and counsel.

At a national level, the NCT is working towards improving services for all parents. As part of that role, the NCT has recently put forward a position paper to the new government in which they ask for:

- Parenting education as part of the national curriculum in schools
- Parent-centred, drop-in pregnancy groups and antenatal classes for all expectant parents
- Continuous support from a familiar midwife during labour for all women
- Easy access to education and support groups for all parents of under-fives
- Research into parents' needs for information and support, and evaluation of new and existing services.
