

Significant changes ahead at 180 Brockley Road

The narrow site at 180 Brockley Road has been home to Brockley Motors since 1960. Prior to that it was the site of the Ritz, a cinema open between 1913 and 1954 under various names including the Brockley Picture House, the Giralda and the Palladium.

The site is currently the subject of a major planning application to redevelop. New proposals will create 25 new apartments, with units for shops or cafes on the ground floor facing Brockley Road. We think that the developer, McDonald Egan, and his architect have consulted well with local people including groups such as the Brockley Society and Brockley Cross Action Group. They have listened well, and come up with a

scheme that could work for this site. The new retail units should offer Brockley's shopping centre a chance to expand. The design is contemporary but sympathetic, and uses high quality materials and brickwork.

In following this project closely, we have learnt something about the level of public contributions that developers make to the public purse for buildings like these. As part of a deal struck with Lewisham Council if this project goes ahead, McDonald Egan will contribute £41,834 to local education, £32,500 to health, £20,816 for leisure facilities, £37,053 to Lewisham's open spaces, £7,851 for community centres/libraries, £21,206 for employment training, and

£90,000 towards public realm improvements in Coulgate Street. As well as this, the developer will contribute nearly £250,000 through the London Assembly for Crossrail. The eventual profit margins on this building for the developer are likely to be less than 10% - though there will be a further clause in the planning consent that means if profits rise above 20%, then further contributions will be made to Lewisham for affordable housing.

We thought that it is worth pointing this out. Not all development is bad, and not all developers are cynical. We look forward to seeing this project get consent, and for building works to start.

Night Time Aircraft Noise

Many residents of Brockley have noticed a dramatic increase in aircraft noise levels, frequency and duration. Starting as early as 4.30am and often going until after 11pm without break. It negatively affects many of us, waking us & depriving us of sleep.

BAA is running a "pilot scheme". The direct effect is that Brockley and around are the new areas experiencing more aircraft noise (despite BAA claiming that stats show no change). It is on a "rota" basis although the rota is undefined; some weeks are randomly as quiet as they used to be but other weeks (the majority) are unbearable. The scheme is supposed to give "early morning respite" to other areas. This does not explain the noise throughout the rest of the day/night.

This trial period started on 5 November 2012 and is due to complete in March 2013. If it is considered a "success" it may become permanent. Please do not let this happen.

We accept that reasonable noise during "waking hours" may be unavoidable, but we object to "middle of night" noise. If you are experiencing this disruption or want to support your neighbours PLEASE log your complaint at:

Night 'respite' trials in South East London:

HACAN has been working with Heathrow Airport, BA and Air Traffic Control to trial 'no fly' zones at night to give people in South East London a break from the Heathrow planes until just before 6am. Every second week residents in some areas are getting no planes until almost 6am. However, we know from your feedback that the trial has resulted in more planes pre-6am in other areas. The trials are until the end of March. After that, they will be assessed. If they have not worked out, they will not be resumed or will be adapted.

Summary of Thameslink Programme

William Badenhorst, secretary of Crofton Park Transport Users' Group, told Brockley Society's AGM last November how this major rail upgrade will affect us.

The Thameslink programme is a large rail infrastructure programme and the franchise will be the largest in the country.

It will combine services currently operating though the 'Thameslink core' - i.e. those that pass underground between St Pancras and Farringdon to continue southwards mainly to Sussex and Kent destinations, and also gradually incorporate other services in Southeast London.

The substantial investment has created some flagship central London stations, which provide residents in this part of London with crucial connections to London and international transport arteries; Blackfriars for the tube; Farringdon for eventual Crossrail services to Heathrow; and St Pancras International for Channel tunnel services.

Brockley residents have an important resource therefore from nearby Crofton Park station, which provides trains on this route. This route has historically been underserved, currently having only two trains per hour. CPTUG is working to ensure that the frequency increases. We have support from the Mayor of London; unfortunately though

the Secretary of State for Transport has not been supportive.

Crofton Park station services should be seen in conjunction with the overground services from Brockley station, as giving local residents an integrated transport network connecting to Central London.

We have seen the success of the 'East London line extension' overground line:

- Phase I (2010) from Crystal Palace/Croydon South through Honor Oak Park/Brockley, which has provided excellent services and financial management. This service is very popular and rapidly became over-crowded to the extent that platforms had to be lengthened to accommodate longer trains. In Crofton Park we witnessed people giving up on the very poor quality services from our line, walking or being driven instead to stations like Brockley, contributing to this overflow and overcrowding.
- Phase II (December 2012) from Surrey Quays to Clapham Junction through Peckham Rye/Denmark Hill. Although it is only a few weeks since this new Overground line came into operation, it is already proving so popular that it's causing enormous strain on the 'Catford loop' services through Crofton Park, as a large number of passengers are now changing from the

Overground at Peckham Rye/Denmark Hill and joining the SouthEastern/Thameslink services to Blackfriars and further north or to Sevenoaks. This increase in use was not envisaged when the paltry two trains per hour timetable was drawn up many years ago.

There are two main strategies available:

- Put pressure on the Secretary of State through elected representatives (e.g. Joan Ruddock MP), to ensure a fair deal in the new franchise arrangements. This would mean asking specifically that the train frequency from Crofton Park station should be increased in line with need and demand to four tph, and that these should continue north of Blackfriars (not terminate there).
- To support the Mayor of London's bid to have TfL take over control of 'Catford loop' stations such as Crofton Park. We think that TfL has an excellent track record with their overground services and their financial management.

CPTUG urges the Brockley Society to write to the Mayor of London to support a TfL take-over, with specific reference to a need for 4tph going beyond Blackfriars, as well as to Joan Ruddock, asking her to raise these issues with the Transport Secretary.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Before you start making decisions on any changes to your property, we strongly advise that you look at the Council's guidelines for preserving the Brockley Conservation Area. These will give you a good idea of what is acceptable development:

If you would like to object to plans for unsympathetic or inappropriate development, please advise the Brockley Society. The more objections the council receives, the more likely the development is to be questioned. If you would like to support something, again, let us know – community pressure does actually work!

Applications Granted

The retention of an illuminated fascia sign and an advertisement on the awning to the front elevation at **173 Brockley Road**.

The construction of a single storey extension at the rear of **145 Upper Brockley Road**, together with the installation of a roof light in the rear roof slope and alterations to the rear elevation.

Alterations to **Unit 3, Ashby Mews**, including replacement roofs, the installation of roof lights, doors and a circular window to the front.

The installation of replacement heritage roof lights to the side and rear roof slopes in connection with the conversion of the loft space and the construction of a replacement single storey extension to the rear of **1 Hillyfields Crescent**.

The construction of iron handrail and balustrade to the external staircase at the rear of **212a Tressillian Road**, together with the installation of a double sash window and a lead-clad roof to landing of the external staircase and the replacement of the access door to the landing with timber framed glazed double doors. Replacement single storey extension at the rear of **17 Hilly Fields Crescent**, together with new roof and 4 roof lights.

The replacement of the roof above the kitchen and installation of roof lights at **165 Breakspears Road**, together with the installation of new doors in the rear elevation.

The installation of replacement timber double-glazed sliding sash windows to the front elevation and replacement double-glazed timber casement windows at basement level in the rear elevation of **66 Upper Brockley Road**.

The installation of replacement double glazed windows in front, side and rear elevations, and a double doors in the rear elevation of **158 Upper Brockley Road**.

The re-filing of **41 Manor Avenue**, with Rivendale Eternit slates, the replacement of the existing flat roof covering with glass reinforced plastic, the installation of two rooflights to the rear roof slope, and further minor works to the exterior of the property.

The alteration and conversion of **134 Lewisham Way** to provide 2 one-bedroom, 1 two bedroom and 1 three bedroom self-contained flats, together with the construction of a single-storey rear extension with roof terrace above, alterations to the rear elevation and provision of a bin store at the front.

The replacement of the concrete tile roof covering at **36 Tyrwhitt Road**, with natural slate.

The installation of two roof lights in the side roof slope at Flat 3, **18 Wickham Road**.

The construction of an infill extension at the rear of **166 Malpas Road**, together with alterations to the rear and side elevations, and alterations to side roof slope.

The construction of a two-storey three bedroom house with associated landscaping and provision of bins and bicycle stores on land south of **Upper Brockley Road** (sited to the rear of **163 Upper Brockley Road**).

The construction of a roof extension and formation of roof terrace to the front of **12A Montague Avenue**, together with the installation of railings around the roof terrace.

The demolition of the existing garages at the rear of **2 Breakspears Road** and the construction of a two storey building to provide 2 three-bedroom semi detached houses.

Replacement of existing public telephone kiosk outside **Brockley Barge Public House**, Brockley Road with combined public telephone service and ATM Service Kiosk.

Every other week, the Brockley Society joins the other local conservation societies at the Council's Amenity Panel Meeting. Here we raise formal objections, ask questions, and give our input on local development. These meetings help to determine whether planning applications are approved or go on to be raised at the public planning meetings. The public meetings give applicants and objectors a chance to have their say to enable the Council to reach a decision. The alteration and conversion of **Units 1 & 2 Ashby Mews**, together with the replacement of the front boundary wall and the construction of a first floor extension to provide a live/work unit comprising 217.4m² of self contained residential accommodation and a roof terrace at first floor level and 570m² of B1(c) commercial space (as existing) at ground floor level.

The conversion of the existing garage at **24 Garsington Mews**, together with the installation of a window to provide habitable accommodation.

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Root Cause: Tree Warden Report

Whilst much of our work as Tree Wardens for the Brockley Society centres on the care and maintenance of our street trees, we also monitor applications for tree works on private property within the conservation area.

Many of the applications that come before the Planning Department are for pruning or pollarding, or for removal of trees that are not intrinsically valuable. But the most

difficult decisions involve subsidence attributed to tree root damage. These applications often involve large, irreplaceable mature trees of considerable value. The Brockley conservation area has some wonderful examples of mature trees

including St. Margaret's Road and Adelaide Avenue.

Most trees near buildings cause no damage. Subsidence has other causes such as poor foundations and soil conditions (particularly in erratic weather). A commonly held belief is that there is as much tree beneath the ground as above it. In fact most trees, especially natives, are shallow rooted. Even the largest trees have roots only a few inches deep. Anyone who has seen an uprooted tree on its side with just a few roots in the ground yet still growing may wonder how the tree survives. In our climate, trees need relatively little root mass to sustain them. Roots spread mainly to aid the stability of the tree.

Even where a tree is contributing to subsidence, removing it can worsen the problem. Without the tree soaking up moisture in wet weather the soil can swell causing 'heave'.

The loss of mature trees in London was investigated in the 2007 London Assembly report "Chainsaw Massacre" (chaired by Darren Johnson). Worryingly, in some boroughs, up to 40% of trees lost every year were due to subsidence claims, with insurance companies pressurising councils to remove trees with little or no evidence they were causing a problem. Councils wishing to avoid legal disputes are liable to give in. The result is the loss of mature trees and a trend to plant smaller trees.

Your Tree Wardens have developed a constructive relationship with Green Scene (who manage green public space and street trees) and we are actively seeking to establish a clearer working relationship with the Planning Department who manage tree applications in the conservation area.
