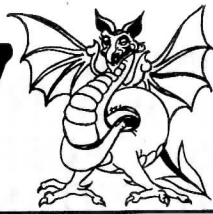

## The Brockley Conservation Area

### Why is it so special?

Conservation is not some vague official function removed from reality, but a vital part of life. As with the environment generally, it makes good economic and practical sense to preserve, repair and recycle wherever possible rather than demolish, replace or destroy that which has taken so long to build, mellowed with age, shown the beauty of craft traditions and become part of our cultural memory and continuity.

Conservation areas are those of "special architectural or historic interest the character of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance". Their special qualities have therefore been given legal status under which the planning system offers greater protection, not necessarily to prevent change, but to ensure preservation or enhancement.

This protection entails control of demolition of any building or part of a building and special policies on roof alterations and extensions. All trees are protected against felling, lopping or pruning without authorisation.

In Brockley it is the street front which matters most, including front boundary walls. Attention to the smallest details, timber sash windows, door furniture, chimney pots, front paths and all ornaments have considerable impact. The installation of UPVC windows or the turning of the front garden into a car park have been the subject of enforcement action to rectify the damage these alterations do to the character of our Conservation Area. It is reported elsewhere that the blot on our landscape at 35 Wickham Road, the eastern style red brick

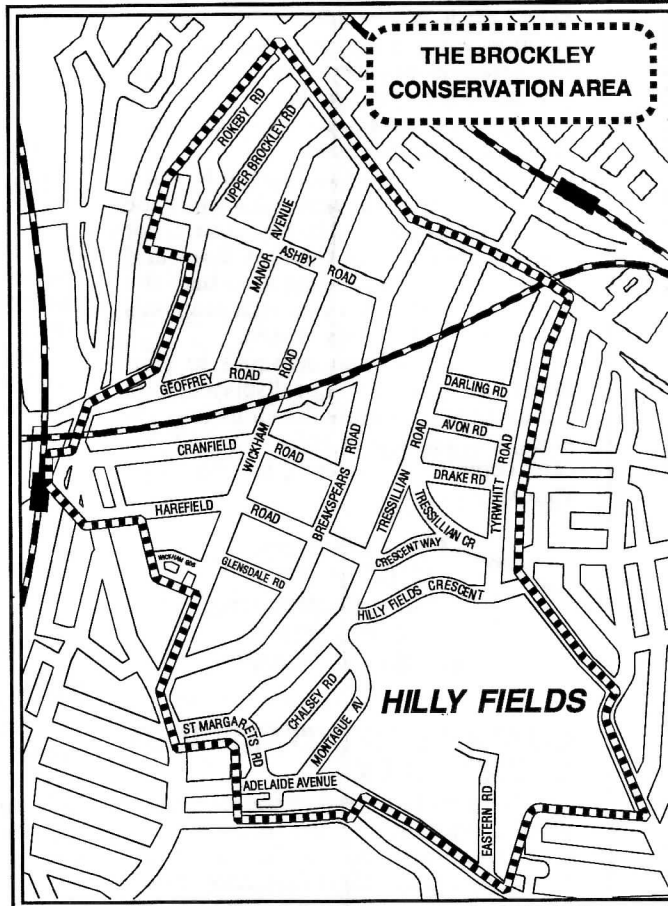
wall will soon be gone, the Council is enforcing its removal.

Brockley is the third largest Conservation Area in Lewisham. It is made up mainly of three residential areas developed between 1840 and 1884. Other than infilling of bomb sites after the Second World War, the only major changes have been Myatt Garden School, 1972, South East London Technical College, 1927, 1964 and 1979 and the magnificent listed Carnegie Library on Lewisham Way, 1914.

A smaller change, but just as threatening has been the erosion of the long back gardens which give the character of so much of the area by developing some of the mews frontages for housing. These long back gardens give open views, especially across the mews and the mature trees give a rural character to the area. The mature pear trees are a relic of the orchards which stood here before the area was developed and are to be cherished. Brockley is a very peaceful residential area with plenty of garden space.

There is scope for improvement. Most of us would agree that some roads desperately need traffic calming measures, positive parking schemes and improvements to the street appearance. The street furniture, street signs, paving and lighting leaves much to be desired. There have been many insensitive alterations to buildings which should be reversed and the reinstatement of original features as and when possible will go a long way towards improving the visual impact of our area. The scope for new building is small, and it needs to be carefully designed to blend in with the existing houses. We need to jealously guard the open aspect of our area and not allow our garden space to be eroded. These are some of the things that the Brockley Society members feel strongly about and are working to improve.

English Heritage, the Department of the Environment and Lewisham Council all recognise that Brockley is a special area, to be looked after and cared for. We should be proud to be able to live here and we should do everything possible to improve it. *Gillian*

## COUNCIL PROPOSAL TO CLOSE GEOFFREY ROAD AND MANOR AVENUE

Lewisham Council Highways Sub-Committee is proposing to close Geoffrey Road and Manor Avenue to end local traffic 'rat runs'. Residents in the two roads directly affected have been sent questionnaires by the Council asking whether or not they approve of the proposed closures.

Our view in the Brockley Society is that we welcome traffic calming measures in the Conservation Area but not when they are introduced in isolation. What we need is a comprehensive set of proposals that looks at the Conservation Area as a whole, not a series of piecemeal decisions that merely create knock-on problems in the next street.

Whilst the closure of these two roads would obviously benefit the residents of Geoffrey Road and Manor Avenue, it has the potential to cause even worse traffic problems for the people living in the neighbouring streets, especially Cranfield Road and Harefield Road.

We have asked the Council to call a public meeting in the area so that everyone who might be affected by the closure, not just the residents of Geoffrey Road and Manor Avenue, get a chance to hear the reasoning behind the Council's proposals and to put their points of view.

A leaflet will be delivered to your house, and posters will be displayed, look out for them and make the effort to come along and make your voice heard. If you can't come to the meeting you can send your views to:

## CHANGES TO BUS SERVICES IN BROCKLEY

You may have read in the local press about changes to local bus routes that are to be introduced in March. The main change which will affect the Conservation Area will be the combining of the L1, 184 and P2 services. The new service, which will be called the 484, will run from Lewisham Bus Station, follow the current L1 route to Turnham Road where, instead of terminating, it will continue through Peckham and East Dulwich on the P2 route, and then follow the 184 route to Camberwell Garage. The new service will run every 10 minutes; the L1 currently runs every 20 minutes.

This new service, to be operated by Kentish Bus, should bring the improvements of more frequent buses and a through route all the way to Camberwell, which will be particularly useful for journeys to the King's College and Maudesley Hospitals at Denmark Hill.

## TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS IN THE CONSERVATION AREA

The problem of speeding cars in the Conservation Area continues to pose the threat of a serious accident. On 30th November a speeding car in Hillyfields Crescent went out of control and collided with two parked cars; one of the cars was a write-off. This accident was reported to the police, so will be recorded in the accident statistics for the area.

Keeping accurate records is very important in helping us put together a case to pressure the Council to take action and introduce traffic calming measures in the Conservation Area.

Council decisions on priorities for spending on traffic calming are made on the basis of the accident statistics, so if you are involved in a traffic accident in the area, even if the police are not involved, you should let the Council have details of the accident; you can write to:

Plans have been approved for South London Family Housing Association to build forty nine homes on the site of the old nursery in Upper Brockley road. Clearing the site ready for construction will start in February and thirty two sheltered flats for the elderly, sixteen family house and one wheelchair house should be ready for occupation in March 1995.

Many of you will remember him as the no-nonsense Yorkshireman who brought sense to many a meeting of the Brockley Society since its beginning in 1974. Bill and Kathleen lived in Tressillian Road for over forty years, but moved two years ago to Litchfield to be nearer their son.

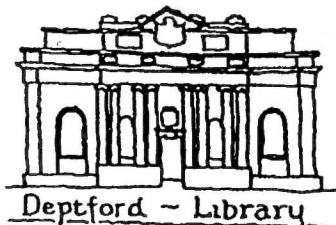

## Positive steps

Our last report in September said that the Council is now actively looking for groups to lease the building either in the short or long term, but the fabric is now so dilapidated that several potential users are frightened of the financial implications of trying to repair the building to an acceptable standard, and of the ongoing renovation costs. The Council as owners are now aware of these problems and are considering financing a complete new roof and the basic internal repair work, if a suitable user can be found quickly. The annual cost of employing security guards is comparable with the cost of a new roof.

In our view this is the only sensible way forward. It is only a pity that this could not have been done two years ago and the building would not have suffered so severely from the elements. A potential user is the Lewisham Art House who have to move this spring to allow Hilly Fields school to be refurbished for Prendergast's Girls' School. They need studio and gallery space, and they also provide classes for the public in drawing, painting and other fine arts. This building in its prominent position on Lewisham Way would be ideal.

Another user could be Lewisham College, who have ideas about using the top part of the building as rehearsal space. There is also the possibility of Horniman's Museum moving part of its displays here as they have structural problems with their own buildings. All of these uses, particularly gallery and museum space, are well suited to the building and will keep the building in community use.

The Friends of Deptford Library are still very much involved and the Brockley Society are hoping to be able to co-ordinate the users to provide enough income to satisfy the Council and also to use the building to its best advantage.

Dear Resident,

We write to inform you of an important community project under threat.

Lewisham Arthouse is an arts centre that arose from the 1992 Lewisham Visual Arts Festival. It provides a gallery, educational workshops, facilities for community groups, a ceramic room with kiln, a darkroom and affordable studio spaces for over eighty artists.

The Arthouse has not received any government, Arts Council or local authority funding although specific projects and courses have secured small scale part-funding on a one-off basis. The organisation therefore has a small budget and is run on a voluntary basis by the artists who rent studio spaces.

In 1992 Lewisham Arthouse was allowed to use the Hilly Fields School site owned by Lewisham Council. The Council is obliged to raise their income by selling property to the private sector and has announced that the Hilly Fields building has been sold for redevelopment. Lewisham Arthouse is therefore forced to find an alternative site for its activities. No firm commitment has been made by the Council to give continued support to us.

Lewisham Arthouse has over the past eighteen months provided:

- ☆ Lewisham's first public gallery. A venue for over twenty exhibitions of work by both individual artists and community groups including the '92 Lewisham & Southwark Open and Lewisham Council's own '93 Open show.
- ☆ Spring and summer workshops open to all ages.
- ☆ Two large craft fairs in Dec. '92 & '93.
- ☆ Opportunities for local schools to expand their educational facilities.
- ☆ Employment opportunities for local artists including links with the LAADE artists in residence scheme.
- ☆ Representation of Lewisham abroad by taking exhibitions to France, Strasbourg and Budapest. (Strasbourg and Budapest booked for '94 & '95)
- ☆ A focal point for arts throughout the borough, London and beyond.
- ☆ A reduction in crime on Hilly Fields as a result of the 7 day-a-week use of the building and 24 hr caretaker.

If any of these activities are to be maintained and our commitments for future events sustained it is vital that this centre for the arts survives.

We are inviting those who have been involved with the Arthouse, enjoyed our facilities or who wish to support our organisation to contribute by lobbying local councillors and MPs, writing to local newspapers and sending letters of encouragement. These will be displayed on our 'Wall of Hope' in our forthcoming exhibition from 23 Feb. to 27 Feb. 1994.
