TRAFFIC, RAT RUNS AND THE CONSERVATION AREA

The discussions over the proposal to close Geoffrey Road have highlighted the fact that there are a lot of commuter "rat runs" in the Conservation Area.

People living on roads used by commuters suffer from the noise and pollution twice a day in the rush hours, children can't walk to school without an adult, and there are regular road accidents.

But just closing off rat runs or putting in traffic calming measures is not that simple, as the reactions to the proposals to close Geoffrey Road and Manor Avenue showed - many other issues have to be taken into account, such as:

- the need for the emergency services to have easy access to and through the Area.
- bus services won't run along roads with speed humps.
- people who live in the Conservation Area need to be able to get to and from their homes without driving half way round the borough in a one-way system.

Identifying the issues - the discussion

These issues were discussed at the last meeting of the Brockley Society on 6 April. A number of different views were put forward, from taking to bicycles to refusing any road closures. What these discussions showed was that we need more information about two things:

- where exactly does the traffic come from and go to?
- what traffic control measures (if any) do users and residents of the Conservation Area want?



GRAFFITI

There has been a general increase in the graffiti appearing, not only in Brockley, but in the surrounding area as well.

Bromley Council already have an anti-graffiti 'group' who will remove any graffiti in the area free of charge. Isn't it time that Lewisham Council did the same? If you feel strongly on this subject, please lobby Lewisham Council.

Still on the subject of graffiti, with local artist, Lindsay MacFarlane due to paint the final panel of the mural, it is now more important than ever that we make good use of the anti-graffiti paint we already have. All we need now is a fine day!

Traffic survey - we need your help.

To answer the first of these two questions we are planning to carry out a traffic survey to identify the routes that commuter traffic takes through the Conservation Area. For one morning rush-hour we plan to station people at all the main entry and exit points in the Area to record car numbers. Then we can use the records of where individual cars entered and left the Area to trace the rat runs. This means that rather than just knowing how many cars pass through the Area we will be able to tell what routes they use.

However, to carry out this survey we need a lot of people who are willing to give up an hour on a summer morning before work, school or chores. We plan to carry out the survey on Wednesday 6 July. Can you help by giving up an hour of your time? If you can, please ring Lindsay on 081 692 7869.

What do you want - we need your views.

Armed with the information from the traffic survey we hope to put some helpful suggestions to the Council on how they could improve the traffic situation. But we want to make sure our suggestions take account of a broad range of views from parents, the elderly, drivers, pedestrians, cyclists, residents of busy roads, users of the bus - everyone who lives in the Area has a right to have their say. PROPOSED CLOSURE OF GEOFFREY ROAD AND MANOR AVENUE

Our piece in the last newsletter about Lewisham Council's proposal to close Geoffrey Road and Manor Avenue attracted a lot of attention.

Residents of Harefield and Cranfield Roads were worried that the closures would divert traffic down those roads.

Residents of Geoffrey Road were concerned that the absence of through traffic passing-by would lead to an increase in muggings on the road.

Residents of the service road on Lewisham Way at the bottom of Manor Avenue wondered how on earth they would be able to get home!

Just after the last newsletter went to press we were able to hold a meeting with Liam Johnston from the Council's Traffic Services and Councillor Jimmi Adefiranye. We put forward the Brockley Society's view that there was a need to consider the knock-on effect of the proposed closures.

As a result of that meeting the Council have postponed the closures whilst they carry out a further study to assess the potential effects on neighbouring roads.

This is proving to be a very complicated issue but the results of the study are expected in August, when the Council will send out questionnaires to residents in the affected roads to ask for their views.

POLICE LIAISON Breakspears Arms

The social and street problems around Coulgate Street and the now infamous Breakspears Arms public house has generated enormous local concern. The Breakspears Arms remains closed pending the appeal against the revocation of the licence, held before Lewisham Magistrates Court on May 25th.

Police and concerned local residents hope to see the closure enforced for at least one and possibly two years before the pub is re-licensed under new ownership. This period of time is thought necessary to disperse the illegal drug dealing and the related crimes in and around the Breakspears Arms.

The last meeting of the Brockley Society voted unanimously, with one abstention, to support the Brockley police in their aim to prevent the re-opening of the pub for this year at least. Since the pub closed in January there have been no drug related crimes in the area.

The installation of the new British Rail footbridge connecting Coulgate Street and Mantle Road is due in August and September subject to BR track closure. This was the scene of most robberies and muggings related to the drug dealing in Coulgate Street.

It is hoped that the new footbridge, together with the new lighting system in Coulgate Street, eventual CCTV on and near the bridge, and the rehabilitation of the Breakspears Arms will finally put an

end to the criminal presence in the area, and the very real fear of crime felt by those passing through it.

Thanks are due to the Crime Prevention Panel of Hatcham Wood School under the leadership of Deputy Head John Ratcliffe. By their many hours of hard work and enthusiasm they provided the police, the court, the council and others with invaluable data concerning the pub and the footbridge.

The Brockley Sector Working Party

This matter has been the subject of much debate – sometimes heated – at the Brockley Sector Working Party which continues to meet on a regular basis at the Brockley Social Club. The aim of these meetings is to enable local people to get to know their local police, to enable the police to become more closely involved with the local community and to create a forum for discussion between the community and our sector officers.

The meeting is open to anyone living or working in Brockley. For those wishing to attend the next meeting date is Wednesday 13 July at 7 p.m.

Neighbourhood Watch

A direct spin-off from the Sector Working Party is the aim to regenerate the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme in Brockley. Over the years many of the Watches in the area have become inactive and it is the intention of Brockley officers to re-launch Neighbourhood Watch Schemes where possible and to create new ones where there is sufficient interest. Watch co-ordinators are meeting Sector officers regularly to decide how this can best be achieved.

Operation Bumblebee

The Operation Bumblebee Roadshow in Woolwich Town Hall was an Aladdin's cave of stolen property awaiting reclamation by its owners. Despite the ease of marking and recording our valued possessions many items were unidentifiable and may never be returned to their owners.

If you live in a Neighbourhood Watch area your Watch coordinator will advise you how to mark and photograph your property. The presence of a "marked property" sticker in your window will also help to deter thieves.

Our Sector Inspector, Steve Thomas, has now left Brockley to take promotion as Chief Inspector in Plumstead. Our congratulations go with him and we await news of his replacement.

Lock your garden shed

At the last LPCCG meeting it was made known that thieves are turning their attention to garages and garden sheds. Stolen lawn mowers, hedge trimmers, DIY equipment, bikes and barbecues are adding to the lists of stolen property and finding their way to car boot sales.

Don't let your home security stop at the back door – make sure your shed and garage is secured and that everything inside is properly marked. The officers at the local Crime Prevention Office will be happy to advise. Phone 081 697 9411.

New Police Station

The LPCCG was also informed that the new Lewisham Police Station will be developed on the site of the old Army & Navy store in Lewisham.

THE BROCKLEY NURSERY SITE

On Saturday 8th March, early in the morning, bulldozers moved onto the site to clear it ready for building the new housing for the South London Family Housing Association. They started on the trees. The local residents had ensured that the trees were protected by getting tree preservation orders put on them in 1991.

All this was to no avail – the trees were being felled like ninepins. The contractors had marked the wrong trees so a cherry was left, but a rare silver birch was felled. The large mulberry "fell down" when a tree supporting it was pulled out.

The ginko had been too small in 1991 for a TPO, so it too was heaved out. They also removed a golden robinia – but left the sycamore!

All this happened to what was the mature garden of the head gardener and need never have been touched, as this particular area is to become the landscaped sitting area for the sheltered housing. No one has seen the crab apple which was in the middle of the site, and by the Tuesday the top had been knocked out of a weeping birch. If it had not been for the local residents, there would hardly have been a single tree left on the site.



They protested on the Saturday and on the Monday and let the contractors know that unsocial working hours would not be tolerated.

They have also made sure that the Council Planning Department is aware of the breaches of planning conditions that were being made and that they are con-

wheels must be hosed down on a hard standing before they leave the site and hard hats must be worn.

The developers, Countryside in Partnership, have made a real effort to rectify the damage to the trees as far as is possible. They have replanted the mulberry and the ginko, and planted six new trees, with an

Old English hedge of several prickly varieties around the edge of the site and they will be turfing the area.

They will replace the crab apple when the houses are built, but the weeping birch will never be the same again.

The Council considered taking legal action against the developers, which could have cost them £20,000. As between £12,000 to £14,000 had by this time been spent on rectification, said the developers, the Council decided against taking so drastic a measure.

It remains to be seen if Countryside in Partnership will look after the new planting and adhere to the conditions for building in a densely populated area. If they do not I am sure that vigilant local people will make sure that things are put right quickly.

VACANT PROPERTIES

There is growing concern about the number of properties in the Conservation Area left vacant and unoccupied for long periods of time. These flats and houses may be privately owned, council owned or owned by housing associations.

It is quite scandalous that there should be so much available housing while there remain so many people with serious housing needs. These vacant properties are costing us all money in lost rent and council tax, money which, we are constantly reminded, is in very short supply and is needed to maintain services in the borough.

Some squatters who occupy vacant properties respect both the property and the neighbours but other squatters have seriously damaged properties and caused a public nuisance.

The Brockley Society would like to contact the owners of these properties to encourage them to make them available for rent and, hopefully, go some way to resolving these problems. PROTECTION OF CONSERVATION AREAS

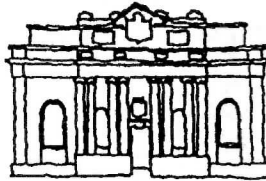
The DOE will be asking Parliament to approve stronger powers for local planning authorities in Conservation Areas. It will allow the authority to introduce stricter controls in areas which it considers merit special attention, once it has consulted with the local people.

The directive could withdraw permitted development rights for a range of development materially affecting some aspects of the external appearance of dwelling houses, such as doors, windows, roofs and frontages.

In a survey last year by the English Historic Towns Forum, mock Georgian doors were found in Edwardian buildings, imitation tudor beams in Victorian houses, glossy plastic signs on traditional high street shops, houses in a Victorian terrace pebbledashed, some with different sized and shaped windows, front gardens concreted over and stick-on porches in odd places.

If the Council asks your views about the Brockley Conservation Area, what will you reply? Do you think people should be allowed to do what they like, and thereby alter the uniformity of a terrace or road of similar houses, or do you think that we should all be made to respect the work and materials of the original designer, even if it means we cannot stamp our own individuality on the outside of our own houses?

WINDOWS - UPVC or PVCU?

It does not matter which. 'Plastic' windows in Conservation Areas are not allowed. There has been a case recently in Tyrwhitt Road where the Council has enforced the Government Act, and made a developer remove the new plastic windows he was so proud of.

All windows in Conservation Areas should be made of materials and designed as the original. It is possible to secondary glaze existing windows, renovate existing windows to exclude draughts, or just replace the rotten parts.

All of these alternatives usually cost less than 'plastic' double glazed windows and will not lower the value of your house when you wish to sell.

JOINER wanted for a labour of love! The large, ornate, carved and panelled oak door to the Lewisham Way old Deptford Library building has been vandalised and is in pieces.
