## New campaign to fight air traffic nuisance

1998:

# STARTING WITH A B.A.N.G.



It's official. Aircraft are flying too low over Brockley. A senior source at the British Airports Authority has confirmed to the Brockley Society that some pilots are taking a 'lazy option' and flying just 3,000 feet over our rooftops.

Apparently the problem comes about when aircraft are directed to make their approach to Heathrow airport. Best practice requires that pilots descend continuously to reach 3,000ft about 10 miles out from the airport where the 'plane picks up a computerised landing beam. However, some pilots on long-haul flights descend to 3,000ft too early and fly level over S-E London until they intercept the beam. Heathrow is fully aware of this problem.

Following a packed public meeting at the end of last year, a dozen local residents have formed a new campaign - Brockley Aircraft Noise Group or B.A.N.G. for short. The campaign now has five targets:

- A reversal of the September 1995 trials which have spread flights over three extra miles of north-east and south-east London
- A complete ban on night flights
- To shift early morning arrivals to the west of Heathrow Airport

- To curb the spread of daytime noise nuisance over south-east London
- Complete opposition to the proposed fifth terminal at Heathrow Airport

At the meeting held last year, a Department of Transport spokesman said there was no indication when the flight trials started in September 1995 would end. He also conceded that the DoT has no noise measuring equipment in our area; the trial results are calculated from equipment close to Heathrow. However, he also confirmed that no test data was taken from the Brockley area before the trial started, so there is nothing to compare the current results with!

While B.A.N.G. would like to see an end to all flights over Brockley, the priority now is to campaign for an end to night flights. The Department of Transport is currently reviewing the whole issue of night flights and has told BrocSoc that local people will be included in consultation this Spring. So far we have heard nothing. British Airways has indicated that they will be asking for an increase in night flights, so it's vital that we all makes our feelings known. If you are at all concerned about the noise and additional pollution from flights over this area, please write to one (or all!) of the names provided. Meanwhile B.A.N.G. is also busy collecting data. A dozen volunteers have started to log the times of noisy aircraft, particularly during

the early morning period. This will be collated and sent to the Noise Environment Manager at Heathrow who has undertaken to follow up each complaint. If necessary, a name and shame policy may be adopted where the worst offending airlines are singled out. B.A.N.G. would welcome any other volunteers willing to log nuisance flights. Lewisham Council's Environmental Health Department is proving very helpful and hopefully noise monitoring equipment will have been installed in Brockley by mid-February.

The Brockley Society also attended the Terminal 5 public inquiry in December and gave evidence about the existing nuisance and the strength of the local opposition to the proposed new terminal. If built, Terminal 5 alone will be Europe's third largest airport. BAA claims that it would only lead to an 8% increase in traffic. Most other estimates say the increase would be nearer 60%. When permission for Terminal 4 was given in 1979, the then inspector said that it should be 'the last major expansion of the airport.'

## PLANES AND GLOBAL WARMING

The rapid growth in air travel has got environmentalists worried. Air transport is currently the most rapidly growing mode of transport both in the UK and globally. In the past 15 years, flights to Heathrow alone have increased by over 80%. However, according to a report published by the Royal Commission on Environmental Pollution in 1994, there are serious concerns about aviation pollution and global warming. An estimated 3.5 million tonnes of ozone-unfriendly nitrogen oxides (2-3% of total manmade emissions) are emitted from aircraft each year while some studies indicate that greenhouse forming carbon dioxide emissions from air traffic worldwide will triple by around 2040.

"There is a powerful case on environmental grounds for regulatory action to avert what could be irreversible damage to the Earth's atmosphere from the growth of air transport," the report states. "An unquestioning attitude towards future growth in air travel and an acceptance that the projected demand for additional facilities and services must be met, are incompatible with the aim of sustainable development."

## NEWS IN BRIEF

### TACKLING EMPTY PROPERTIES

Brocsoc's public meeting on April 1st will feature a talk by Lewisham's Empty Homes Manager Nick Long. Nick will be giving us the latest on the council's strategy to put the borough's 3,000 empty properties back into circulation and what can be done about the derelict and abandoned properties in the Brockley conservation area. The meeting will start at 8pm at St. Peter's Centre, Cranfield Road, SE4. ### MEWS GETS EARLY SPRING CLEAN

Ten households whose gardens back onto Ashby Mews recently clubbed together for a second time to give the mews – one of several private roads in the area not covered by the council – a much-needed clear-up. Around 50 bags worth of dumped rubbish were collected during the clean-up operation which took place over two weekends. Now, most of the potholes have been filled in and the half of the Mews at the Geoffrey Road end has been re-gravelled. The cost of hired equipment and gravel was shared between the group. ### VESTA ROAD BRIDGE

A popular alternative to the Brockley Cross junction, Vesta Road Bridge was closed after its structure started moving in 1995 and 1996, because of slippage of the land next to it.

Will it ever open again? The Council's report to the October Brockley Sector Working Party is unclear.

Although open to pedestrians and cyclists, the road is "formally closed indefinitely, pending completion of the stabilisation of the abutment and wing walls".

Planned strengthening works were frustrated for legal reasons to do with Railtrack allowing access. Central government cuts and a "new system for prioritization for funding" meant funds were not yet available.

The progressive movement is being monitored and Railtrack uses the bridge from time to time for "slope stabilisation works" which are essential if the bridge strengthening is to progress.

Perhaps by the millennium . . .

### ANOTHER NEW SUPERMARKET?

A bid by Tesco to build a new supermarket on the site of the former Hither Green Hospital is facing rising opposition from local people. Local heritage and residents' groups in Hither Green say that there are already ten supermarkets within a two mile radius of the area and that many residents would prefer to see the hospital buildings turned into some kind of community facility. Ideas put forward so far have been for an after school homework club, a cyber-net youth centre, starter units for craftspeople and loft style accommodation for affordable work-homes. The planning brief for the site is currently under review and anyone wanting to comment on Tesco's application or suggest alternatives should write to John Miller, Area Planning Officer, Lewisham Town Hall, London SE6 4RY. 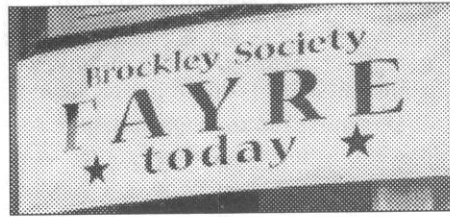

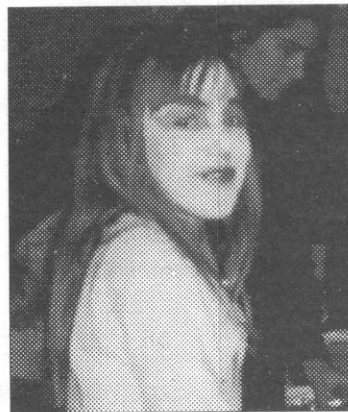
Such is the Fayre's growing reputation that this year we reluctantly had to turn away some interested stallholders because no space was left!

# VICTORY!

Residents have been freed from the threat of having to pay to park outside their front doors.

The January 7 Council Highways Committee meeting decided against a Controlled Parking Zone in the northern part of the Conservation Area which would have meant a charge of £25 per car per annum.

Following our residents survey and the Council's survey of roads to the east and north of the area targetted, we find a complete turn round.

The original recommendation was for residents-only parking in Tyrwhitt, Tressillian, Breakspears and Wickham Roads from Lewisham Way to Drake Road.

As reported in our last issue, the majority of people are against a Controlled Parking Zone, seeing the main problems as student parking in the evenings, traffic speeds and parking near junctions. These views were shared by St. John's residents.

Our first initiative was to meet Lewisham College and ask them to consider the problems. The College is now actively encouraging cycling and has promised to open its car park to evening students, starting this spring. This will keep up to 140 cars off our roads.

The College has also discussed with Connex South East about more trains stopping at St.

John's station. Where we have failed in the past, it seems that the College is winning! As long as Railtrack agrees, there will be additional trains.

This is a great step forward: it reduces college car parking and gives us a better service!

The Council has also agreed to:

- Double yellow lines on the corners of all the roads which run into our long north-south streets
- Speed cushions in Tressillian Road between Lewisham Way and Hilly Fields.
- Speed humps in Tressillian Road between Hilly Fields and St. Margaret's Road, and in Montague Avenue, but residents will be consulted as traffic might divert into Chalsey Road. Humps may be necessary there also.

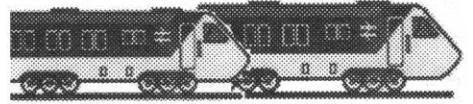
All these measure should happen during the next year.

We are pleased that the Council has listened and gone so far towards our requests.

The measures will be reviewed in a year's time when we will be able to assess the knock-on effect on Tyrwhitt Road and Breakspears Road in particular.

If there are problems we will not be slow to badger the Council again to act to improve the quality of life for all of us.

## More trains for St. John's



Known as the station where the trains never stop, St John's will soon have a new image.

Connex South East has agreed that from May:

- ≡ St. John's will get two more trains an hour (in both directions) in the off-peak period
- ≡ Extra trains will stop in the late morning and early evening to coincide with Lewisham College's timetable and help reduce local parking problems
- ≡ **From the end of May, St. John's will be getting two trains an hour on Saturdays.**

We will benefit from this service and so will Lewisham College, so we must make sure we do not lose it. **USE IT OR LOSE IT!**

When this service is established our next aim is to have trains on Sundays – a distinct possibility, according to Connex, if the new timetable proves popular.

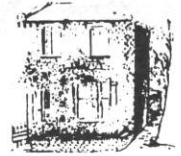

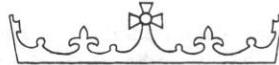
