LETTER FROM THE CHAIR



MUSIC EXTRAVAGANZA HITS THE RIGHT NOTE

The beautiful assembly hall in Prendergast School on Hilly Fields was the venue for a musical extravaganza held on March 20th and it looks like the event hit the right note with many local residents. The first Brockley Society concert proved to be a huge success, yet it was performed by only a fraction of the many musicians who live in the area.

The programme opened with Monteverdi, hit a

high note with solo numbers from musicals by Bernstein and Lloyd Webber and ended with the American folk-song Shenandoah. The final applause from the audience was a sure sign that they had enjoyed the evening and Shenandoah was repeated after enthusiastic calls for an encore.

We weren't sure how many people would be interested in the idea, but on the night almost 100 people arrived for the concert – which was organised and performed entirely by local volunteers. Most importantly, it was a really good way of getting together with old friends and meeting some new faces as well. As people left, many said the same thing: "Let's do it again." I would like to hear your ideas for similar events in the future as well as input from local musicians who are interested in tuning in to Brockley's musical tastes.

A MUSIC FESTIVAL FOR BROCKLEY?

A small number of interested people are exploring the feasibility of promoting a festival in Brockley. Would this take the form of a weekend of different styles of music or would it be better to hold a number of performances spread out over a longer period of time? NEWS IN BRIEF

ACTION ON EMPTY HOMES

Every year, Lewisham Council is faced with the task of providing accommodation for more than 1,000 homeless people in the borough. In 1995, the council came up with a new strategy to help ease the problem and began to target some of the estimated 4,000 private properties standing empty in Lewisham. At the time, the number of empty privately-owned houses made up 6% of the total private housing stock compared with 2% of empty council-run stock.

At the beginning of April this year, the council's Empty Homes Manager, Nick Long, came along to a Brockley Society public meeting to update local residents on what has been happening. The Brockley Conservation Area has at least half a dozen long-term empty or derelict properties and more than 30 local people turned out to hear what is being done to put them back into use.

Mr Long told the meeting that in three years the council's Private Sector Housing Unit has succeeded in reducing the number of empty properties in the borough by more than 1,000, including 25% of all long-term empties. Mr Long said the council's success was down to a 'carrot and stick' approach. This strategy was aimed at locating property owners – particularly those responsible for the many of the empty flats above shops – and encouraging them to either repair their buildings or put them on the market.

If this encouragement was ignored, Mr Long said, the council would then start a sliding scale of legal initiatives, which, in extreme cases, would end in application for a compulsory purchase order (CPO). 'The mere hint of a CPO is usually enough to concentrate the property owner's mind on a programme of action,' Mr Long added. In the case of long-term empty properties, he said that the root of the problem was often associated with mental illness.

As far as the local area is concerned, Mr Long and his team are currently targeting two derelict properties in particular: 14 Manor Avenue and 19 Pepys Road. Discussion between the council and the owners is ongoing but Mr Long added that the Housing Unit is currently considering a CPO in both cases. B.A.N.G. UPDATE

The Brockley Aircraft Noise Group (BANG) is still busy working behind the scenes. At the moment, the Government is considering the issue of night flights. A preliminary consultation document 'Night restrictions at Heathrow, Gatwick and Stansted' was published in February and BANG distributed 6,000 leaflets locally asking people, 'Is It Noisy Enough For You Yet?' and urging them to respond to the document before the closing date at the end of May. The group has also submitted its own detailed response together with other local conservation societies and residents associations.

Despite the consultation period, the Government has made it clear that it proposes no major changes to the current regime which permits anything up to 30 flights between 4am and 6am in the morning to thunder over Brockley. There is also a body of feeling that the whole exercise is just an excuse to extend the same regime for another five years.

Lewisham Council's Environmental Health Department continues to give great support to the BANG campaign and has installed noise monitoring equipment in the conservation area to log and record the time and volume of flights.

The next step is to meet with local MPs and the Ministry. There are also plans for a big petition effort over summer. 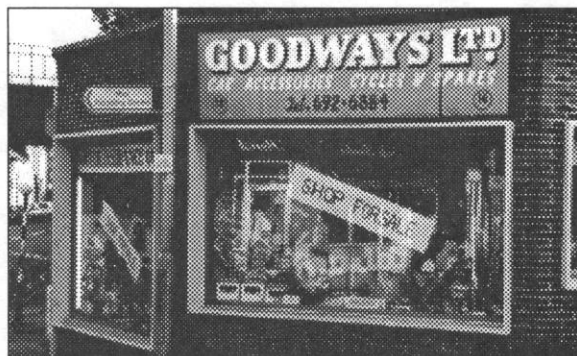

GOODBYE 'MR GOODWAYS'

If you live near Brockley Cross, you might have noticed that a 'For Sale' sign has recently appeared across the front of Goodways auto parts and cycle shop on the corner of Brockley Road and Endwell Road. Known affectionately as Mr Goodways, the store's well-known proprietor Bert Booth plans to close his door for the last time at the end of the summer in order to enjoy a well-earned retirement after 33 years on the Cross.



A number of local people have commented on how much they will miss Mr Booth's 'old-style' service, his friendly smile and his helpful advice on their auto and cycle problems. "There aren't many shop-keepers around like him any more," one local resident told the BrocSoc newsletter. "Both he and his shop remind me of a '50s film. He always goes out of his way to be helpful and he sells all those little bits and pieces that are so hard to find nowadays." Another resident who recently bought a bicycle said, "I'm useless when it comes to fitting things like lights to my bike and Mr Goodways just gets out his little stool

and does it all for me free of charge. He's a diamond."

Mr Booth has lived in Lewisham all his life and comes from a family of ten children. During three decades as owner of Goodways, he has spent most of his spare time rising through the ranks of the amateur ballroom dancing circuit with his wife Joan. The couple have competed in both Europe and the USA and have more than 40 TV appearances on 'Come Dancing' under their belt.

Mr Booth has told the Brockley Society that he would like to thank all his customers for their support over the years. "I wouldn't have stayed in business all these years if it hadn't been for local support and I am very grateful for it," he said. In return, we'd like to thank Mr Goodways, sorry, Mr Booth for his first class service and we wish him and his wife all the very best for the future.

NEW GROUP TO FORM IN ST JOHN'S?

FOUR residents from the St John's area were at a recent Brockley Society meeting because they may wish to start a St John's Society. The matter is still under consideration as they see what the feeling is among local people. There is good support from the vicar at St John's Church.

The question arises partly because there has been a lot of interest surrounding the campaign to protect the Brookmill Park duck pond, endangered by the Docklands Light Railway development.

"We were very pleased to find so many people interested in doing something about their park," one resident told us. "About 40 people turned up for a protest at the pond and the charity Groundworks have become involved."

A compromise has now been reached with Lewisham council: a smaller pond will be kept which will provide for the wildlife, and the recreational value will still be there for local families.

NEW DEVELOPMENTS ON THE BUILDING FRONT

In the summer of 1996, Brockley residents learned that the Wickham Building, part of Lewisham College on Lewisham Way, was to be demolished and replaced by residential housing. Not long afterwards, members of the Brockley Society saw the plans presented by Purelake Homes and they weren't impressed.

The particular part of Lewisham Way in question is on the northern border of the Conservation Area and many people felt it was important that any new development mirrored the local architecture. "The plans were for non-descript town houses with built-in garages", remembers BrocSoc's planning expert Gillian Heywood. "They had no reference to anything in Brockley at all."

Before the Wickham building was constructed in the 1960s, the site had been home to a row of impressive Italian-style Victorian villas, identical to the villa blocks that still stand next to the site today. A small team of BrocSoc members including Gillian, the society's former chairwoman Nicole Livingstone-Smith and local architect Bob Hayes approached the architects, planners and developers in the hope of persuading them to come up with an alternative that would complement the villas next door.

They weren't overly optimistic but thanks to their tenacity, the team's views were gradually absorbed into the project. "You don't expect developers to pay any attention to the views of local people but in this case, it worked out very well. We were helped by the fact that the council's planning officer was of the same view as us," says Gillian.

Today the new development is made up of two villa-style blocks along Lewisham Way containing flats and a row of three and four bedroom houses in the mews behind. It's a great improvement on the original plans. The front blocks have now been named Lloyd Villas after the Victorian music hall singer Marie Lloyd who lived in one of the original houses.

A proportion of the new development has also been given over to 'shared ownership'. When Purelake Homes originally approached Lewisham Council, planning officers stipulated that part of the scheme should be made over to affordable housing. Beaver Housing Association was then brought into the project

to provide a shared-ownership scheme which offers would-be home owners the chance to get a mortgage on 50% of the property while paying a subsidised rent. After a year, they have the option of buying a greater percentage of the property if they wish.

The scheme is aimed at first time buyers, people who have broken up from a relationship, those relocating to a new area for work and low-waged professionals such as nurses and teachers. Within three months of completion, all the flats on the new development had been sold. The only properties now left on the market are the more expensive 3/4 bedroom houses priced in the region of £130,000. Gillian Heywood's conclusion is that Lloyd Villas is now, "far better than anything we would have got if we hadn't intervened." In fact, the new development is so much improved that it was recently shortlisted for Lewisham Council's 'Quality Homes For Lewisham' award.

UPPER BROCKLEY ROAD

Meanwhile more changes have been taking place on the raised parade of shops at the northern end of Upper Brockley Road. Over the years, businesses have come and gone from the parade and currently only one shop survives. Recently, there has been a lot of talk in the neighbourhood about how to inject new life into the parade. Late last year, Cantor Developments put in an application to turn five of the properties along the parade into family houses.

As we all know, certain parts of Brockley have a very transient population and some members of the Brockley Society are keen to see the development of houses, as opposed to flats, in order to encourage young families to stay in the area. The Society has welcomed Cantor's plans to keep the properties on the parade as single units and Gillian Heywood

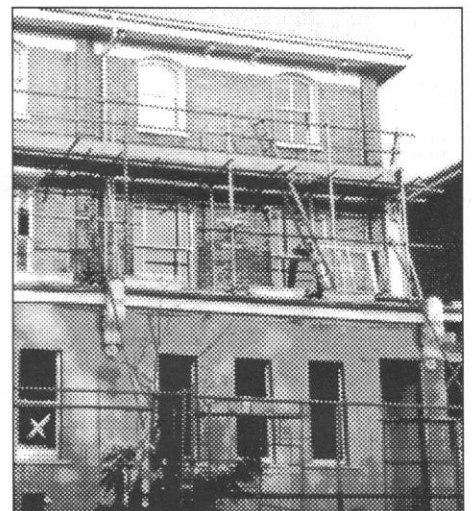


has been asked to contribute suggestions to the overall project.

The current scheme is to provide one 3-bedroom house with a roof terrace and four 4-bedroom houses – all with front and rear gardens. Most welcome is the plan to avoid parking problems for the rest of the residents in the street by making room for cars in the rear gardens. However, there is still slight concern about where the wheely-bins for each new house are going to be placed. Cantor Developments recently sold on the project to a new firm and a fresh planning application has been made to extend the 3-bedroom house. The Brockley Society will be watching future developments closely.
