Brockley from 1845



WORLD CUP night it may have been, but a large audience still arrived at Lewisham College for Gillian Heywood's talk on the history of the area, illustrated with a large number of slides.

A full report is impossible, but here are a few choice items.

- ❖ There are the remains of an ice house in the garden of one of the six elegant semi-detached, flat-fronted houses on Lewisham Way, past Friendly Street. An ice house had brick-lined shelves and a brick dome on top for insulation. It would always be near a pond so that ice could be put inside when it froze in winter. The ice would remain frozen throughout the summer, preserving the food kept inside.

- ❖ William Myatt and then his son Joseph farmed Manor Farm, as it was then called. Their pears, rhubarb and strawberries were famous over the whole country: 1,000 dozen bunches of rhubarb were sold in a day. (This is

where Myatt Garden school gets its name).

- ❖ Comical House, or Stone House, opposite Lewisham College, is the oldest building in the area. It was built in 1776 by an architect, George Gibson, who lived there until 1795. It is still a private house.

- ❖ A canal ran from the Surrey Canal in the north to Croydon in the south. The course ran along the southern part of Shardeloes Road and then Coulgate Street. Started in 1799, it was planned to extend it to Portsmouth. It opened in 1801, but when the Napoleonic wars ended in 1805 there was no point in having the extension, so it only reached Croydon.

- ❖ Railways were faster (though dearer) than canals, which came to be more for pleasure than commerce. So the canal shut in 1836 and in 1841 the London to Brighton railway opened along its path (now the New Cross-Brockley line).

- ❖ Street names often came from the families

who owned the land. Most of the southern part of St Paul's Deptford was owned by the Wickham family by 1750.

- ❖ Daughter Mary married John Drake. Her sister Ann married John's elder brother Thomas Drake, who changed his name to Thomas Tyrwhitt (to inherit from his first cousin-twice-removed, the 6th Baronet, John de la Fountain Tyrwhitt, who had no son). But after the eldest brother William died in 1795 he changed his name again to Thomas Drake Tyrwhitt-Drake so that he could inherit from his father – only just in time, as his father died in 1796!

- ❖ The name Loampit came from the earthworks which were marked on Rocque's map dated 1745. Undercliff, Sandrock and Shell Roads are built on this Loampit. The footpath at the back of Tyrwhitt Road tended to fall down to Sandrock Road and the lower end was closed in 1935.

About stations and trains

- ❖ Lewisham Road Station was at the point where Lewisham Way becomes Loampit Hill (now The Old Station antiques and architectural shop). It opened in 1871 and closed in 1917 because of the war. Houses were swept away in 1868 to build the railway, even though some in Lewisham Way and four at the bottom of Tyrwhitt Road had only just been completed in 1866.
- ❖ Trains from Lewisham Road went to Brockley Lane high level station. The entrance was inside Brockley Cross Furniture at the Brockley Cross rail bridge and the station master lived next to Nicky Fiander's florist shop.
- ❖ On this line you could get to Hammersmith, Blackfriars or Holborn without changing. Those were the days!
- ❖ There was no station at Brockley until 1871, after Cranfield, Harefield and Wickham Roads were completed.
- ❖ St John's Church gave permission for the railway to run across its land on condition that there was a station for the use of its parishioners.

★ Trains from St John's station:

During the day, weekdays and Saturdays, trains go from St John's to London Bridge and on to Cannon Street/Charing Cross every quarter hour at 9, 24, 39 and 54 minutes past. There are more trains at peak times, but fewer in the evenings now the winter timetables operate. Take the trouble to get the timetables for North Kent and Hayes and use the station.

BANG up to date

THE Brockley Aircraft Noise Group (BANG) continues to work to curb the noise nuisance from night flights into Heathrow and the daytime noise nuisance.

BANG has become a founder member of the South East London Aircraft Noise Group, bringing together groups and associations from all over the affected area.

Evidence is now emerging that there was a major and unpublicised change of practice in 1995 by Air Traffic Control to extend the Heathrow final approach to 20 miles.

The outlook for the latest consultation on night flights does not look good, with government refusing to respond to calls for a curfew and confirming the present regime for summer 1999 as well.

LEWISHAM Police have invested in a computerised voice messaging system known as 'RINGMASTER' which they hope will help prevent crime and detect offenders.

RINGMASTER will transmit a recorded message to participants, normally of an urgent nature. For instance, details of a particular type of burglary in a specific area, including descriptions of suspects and/or vehicles.

Lewisham police also hope this will re-establish links with the community.

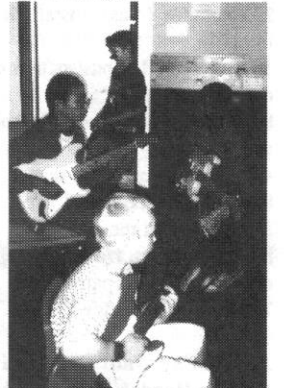

Lewisham Academy of Music



Fun and accessible

— a chance for all young people!

'OUR aim is to make music accessible — and fun — to everyone, and to take the mystery out of it.

'We collaborate with community groups, emphasising contemporary music with opportunities for individual tuition,' said Keith Swales, Lewisham Academy of Music Executive Coordinator.

In mid-September, to celebrate the launch of their new building, LAM held a spectacular five-day music Festival of Future Music in collaboration with the Paradise Bar on New Cross Road.

'The Saturday night was exceptional,' said Keith. 'The energy was incredible from the 200 people in the audience and the exceptional musicians who performed music from around the world.'

The performers were all connected in some way with the Academy and each night was themed to include jazz, R&B, dance, world and even classical music, which was a taster session for a new workshop entitled 'Strings and Things'.

LAM Music Coordinator John Savage is currently developing a whole range of new initiatives to include as many styles as possible.

This year's festival was the first of what is hoped will become an annual event featuring the best of the LAM students.

The facilities are quite amazing and will ensure LAM remains one of London's leading community music organisations, says Keith.

Situated at 77 Watson's Street in Deptford, LAM is next to a park, but sound-proofing is good throughout, to avoid troubling neighbours.

'The new building was opened by Lewisham's mayor Cllr Mark Nottingham. At the launch we released 50 helium balloons from the roof-top — they symbolised the Academy rising to new heights!' said Keith.

Phase III will involve developing the L-shaped courtyard to give a better reception area. There are plans for a Christmas show and a festival next summer using the new balcony and adjacent park.

All instruments are provided for users. Most work is in groups, but there are opportunities for one-to-one tuition. The Academy has a tuckshop for the 10-minute break.

An important member of the team is youth and community worker Ruth Hunter, who is on site during workshops. 'She really relates to the young people who participate,' Keith told me. 'We couldn't manage without her.'

Other staff are studio engineer Don Pinkney and administrator Simon Ferrigno. A wide range of tutors participate in the different workshops.

'The summer school for four weeks in late July was very successful,' Keith said. 'We ran it as a drop-in and had 30-40 young people per day, proving it was very popular.'

Most members live within a 2-3 mile radius of the Academy, but last year's saxophone ensemble for women brought participants from as far away as Leeds. The DJ workshop has people from Cambridge and Brighton!

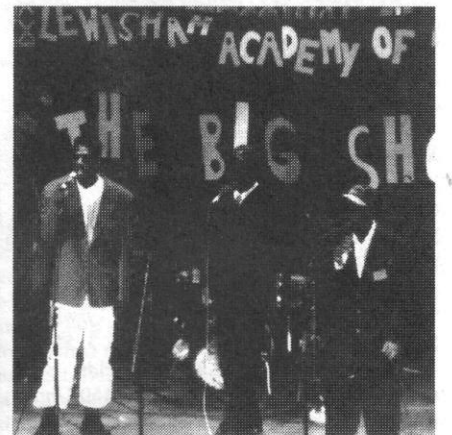

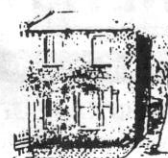
